### BEFORE READING

#### Talk together

- Look at the cover and read the title together. Ask: *What do you think this story is about?*
- Look at the cover picture. Ask: *What is Kipper holding?*
- Look through the book and talk about the pictures.

### About the words in this book

- Your child should be able to sound out and blend some words, which may include:

don't house came here  
saw very glowing inside  
adventure flowerpot

- Some words may be more challenging. Encourage or model blending, then read the words below to your child if necessary.

oh looked called climb  
mountain pulled pushed  
strawberries love



### DURING READING

Enjoy the story together.  
If your child needs support to read the story:

- Remind your child to blend unfamiliar words from left to right.
- If a word is still too tricky, simply say the whole word for your child.
- Re-read sentences to focus on their meaning where necessary.

“What a big mountain!” said Wilf.



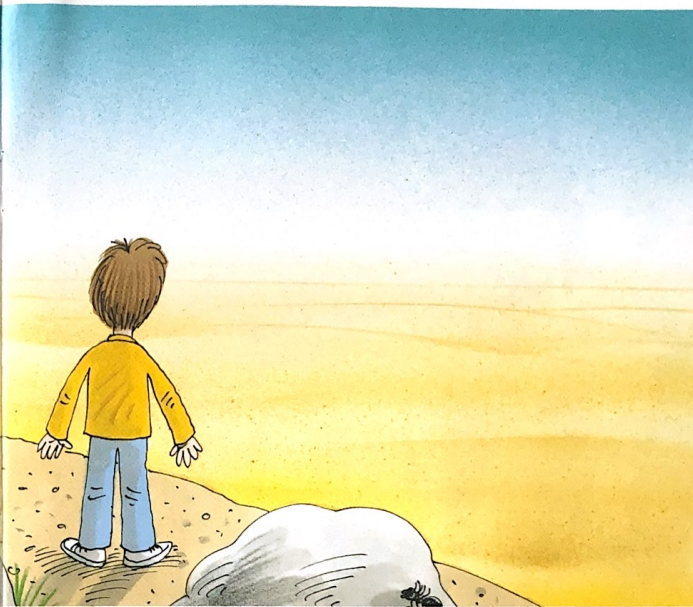
Chip began to climb. He wanted to get

The children got to the top. Kipper was hot.

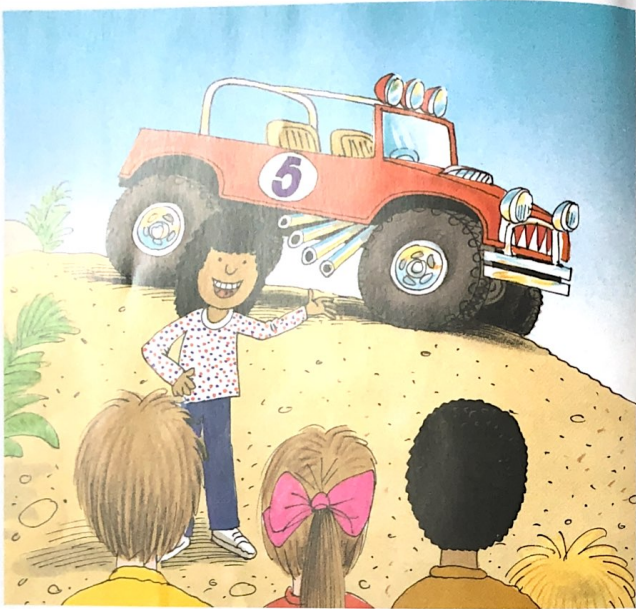
"I don't like climbing mountains," he said.
