## Before reading

## Talk together

Read the title together. Ask: Have you read any other books about dinosaurs?

### Topic words

These words may be tricky or unfamiliar but they are important for the topic.
Read the words together and talk about what they mean.

Chile – a country in South America (p4)

**Diego** – a boy's name (p4, I2, I3)

**dinosaur** – a reptile which lived millions of years ago (p5, 6, 10, 11, 12, 13, 15)

**plants** – living things that grow in soil (p6, I2, I5)

**Chilesaurus** – a dinosaur found in Chile (pl3, 14, 15)

## During reading

If your child has difficulty with a particular word while reading the book:


- break it down into sections, help them to sound it out and blend the sounds together, e.g. a-n-i-m-a-l-s
- tell them the whole word if necessary.

Some words that might be hard to understand are in **bold**. They are explained in the Glossary on p16.




I hit a chunk of soil. The soil had some objects in it.

# Diego's Dinosaur




Diego dug up a dinosaur! It was not like a **T. rex**. It fed on plants.

# Think back!

Talk about the book together and see what your child can remember. Look back to find out the answers if you need to.

- Look at p9. Ask: Can you think of another word that means the same as 'hunting'? (Answer: e.g. chasing, searching)
- Ask: Who dug up the Chilesaurus fossils? (Answer: Diego started, then lots of adults helped, pp10–II)
- Ask: Why was Diego's dinosaur important? (Answer: no one had seen this sort of dinosaur before, pl3)

## Topic words

Read the topic words that were introduced in this book together, then ask your child to find them within the book. Ask them to tell you what each word means, prompting if necessary.

Chile (p4)

Diego (p4, 12, 13)

dinosaur (p5, 6, 10, 11, 12, 13, 15)

**plants** (p6, 12, 15) **Chilesaurus** (p13, 14, 15)

## Write about it!

Ask your child to decide which dinosaur is their favourite: the T. rex or the Chilesaurus. Look through ppI2–I5 together to find out about the differences between these dinosaurs. Ask your child to write one or two sentences about why they think their chosen dinosaur is the best.
